If you had told me a month ago that I would be sporting a borrowed helmet, balaclava, gloves and strapped into a cobalt blue Porsche Boxster at the gate of an Autocross track - I would have thought you were dipping into the medical marijuana. Alas, there I was this past Easter Sunday at the Lake County Sheriff's Training facility participating in my first Florida Citrus Region PCA German Excellence Autocross. And what a thrill it was! It all started a few weeks ago when I was invited to watch my first Autocross race (I had to google Autocross). A girlfriend and I went together and we were not quite sure what to expect. Yet, when we arrived, we received a warm welcome and we really enjoyed meeting a new group of people and getting enveloped in their passion for this exciting relatively unknown hobby. I enjoyed being a spectator - listening to the sounds of screeching tires and the heckles between fellow drivers regarding the demolition of cones and the difference of a .1 second in lap time. A spectator – perfect – a nice way to spend a leisure Sunday afternoon- that was a comfortable place for me.

Now, don't get me wrong - I am an adventure seeker; roller coasters – the faster the better. Sky diving- how high? Scuba diving- sure, I'll give it a go. But being at the helm of a 3,000lb German high performance automobile pushing the pedal

deep into the carpet, to over 50 miles an hour with scattered tight turns, slaloms and limited braking – I'll leave that to this elite class of thrill seekers I had just met.

Well, never say never - After the encouragement of my new boyfriend, against my better judgement and with much nervous trepidation - I registered for my first Autocross race- not as a spectator but as a driver! After the initial fear settled, the excitement slowly began to build. A few days before we did a little practice drive around town - I should mention this was my first time driving a stick shift in more than 20 years and first time ever being fortunate enough to be behind the wheel of a Porsche. I received the track map the evening before and well- it looked more like an abstract drawing to me than a course map – but what did I know. So on that following overcast morning of Easter Sunday – as we drove to the track – yes, my nerves were in full gear.

We arrived at the track just in time for a walk around the track and then right to the drivers meeting. Wait - I was actually a driver? How did this happen?!? I was in the 2nd group so we spent the first half of the day working the section 3 cones with walkie talkie in tow and our red flag. I was glad to be in the 2nd group as it gave me a chance to observe others on the track before I

ventured out for my first time I watched the first group whip around the track, kill cones, swerve and squeal. My eyes were wide open, my heart was racing and fear had officially set in. We are called to line up for the practice round. My knee is shaking on the clutch and my hands are sweaty. Off we go – we parade the track and then back into line-up. Not so bad, I can handle this.....

Next thing I know – I am transferred into the racing seat of Bert's (my fantastic driving instructor) white Cayman– and the reality sinks in. We take off and I mean take off. Full speed, narrowly missing cones with precision and zipping around corners – my white knuckles are gripping the door handles, my teeth are clamped tight, my knees are buckled and I now realize exactly the amount of skill this sport requires. After 2 runs with Bert, he tells me that it is my turn. Really?!? I ask with a nervous smile. I have to admit - after the 2 runs with Bert, I am feeling a little self-doubt. However, quitter I am not, so I take my place in the drivers seat of my newly acquainted Porsche Boxster.

Helmet on- check. Gloves on- check. Seatbelt fastened- check, check. A nervous glance at Bert as I make my way to the green cones – a very big check. My first run is a slow "learn the track" run which boosts my confidence slightly. Bert and I take turns on our runs, me as passenger on one and the next round his turn as passenger coaching me on proper speed control, setting up for the apex and how to avoid understeer. Every run I take my confidence increases as well as my desire to get better. My 2nd and 3rd runs are a tad messy - I go off track and miss a slalom (or two) and I feel the hint of frustration underneath the excitement. Yes, I hit quite a few of those taunting cones and against the instruction of Bert-I hit the brakes a few too many times and my steering needed quite a bit of practice. But each run, I feel slight improvement and an energy to learn this new sport even more. I am truly fascinated by the skill, control and calculation required to complete a 50-60 second track run and how vital every .1 second really is and... those darn cones....

My second run was 62 seconds and my final run was 56 seconds (plus 2 cones) for a total of 58 seconds. I managed to shave of 4 seconds and man it felt good. Minus the cones I was only 2 seconds

behind my boyfriend's best run of the day – Booyah! Some fierce and friendly competition might be a little fun....

A big thank to everyone at the PCA Autocross – thanks for making me feel so welcome. I want to give a few well deserved shout-outs to my new friends - Bert DelVillano - thank you for your patience and understanding and great sense of humor. Nancy Phillips - thank you so much for letting me borrow your gear and for proving that women can play right alongside the boys. Ian Collins – thank you for motivating me to try something new, introducing me to a shared passion and for trusting me with your car!

In conclusion, a new passion is in the making- I WILL get to a more competitive run, with no cones down! I cannot believe that I am now my own honorary member of that elite thrill seekers club that I never thought I would ever be a part of. Although I spend my week days in an exciting world of cutting deals in the world of commercial real estate, cutting corners around cones is a very welcome weekend stress release. It was a truly amazing day and one I will not forget. To round off this great day - To further add to the fun of the day Mark Hide(Nemesis) beat Dave Lincon again – which as I have learned - is one of the latest, and most intense rivalries in autocross history, made more exciting with them both sporting the same cars and experience...

(Update. I have since attended the very good PCA Drivers Improvement day in my own car and been Autocrossing at the Daytona Go-Kart track. See you at the next Tavares event on May 17th. Come and say hi.

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

Jane Scaletta, organizer of the event, introduced the concept for the night, and the fun began with visits to the Market Table with salads, soups, imported cheese selection, and fresh vegetables followed by delicious cuts of meat served by the gaucho chefs that expertly carve and serve fresh at your table choice cuts of filet mignon, rib eye, top sirloin, chicken, lamb, pork loin, sausages and more. Pure indulgence was controlled by the flip of a green or red sided card that indicated whether you wanted more...or had enough.

Throughout the night there were video showings of Porsche tradition, history and enlightening fascina-

tion with this incredible sports car we all know as Porsche.

The first restaurant was built in 1979, built of a wood structure and nestled in the countryside of Porto Alegre. In 1987, it opened its second restaurant in São Paulo due to its popular tasty Brazilian experience. Then in 1997, the Fogo concept was exported to the U.S. with a stateside debut in Dallas, Texas. Fogo now has over 29 restaurants in Brazil and the U.S.

The Car Control Clinic is a fun filled and exciting day of learning. It is one of the few activities open to licensed drivers below the age of 18, and it can be an excellent activity for a parent and a new driver. Participants will be paired with a group of experienced coaches who will lead you through a day of thrilling discovery in a parking-lot course. This is not a racing school. This event teaches you the skills and techniques necessary to properly control your car or every-day driver. You will have fun while learning to be a safer and more competent driver.

The one-day school includes a combination of classroom instruction and individual behind-the-wheel clinics. Lunch and drinks are provided.

The one-day of the skill clinic includes:

Wet Skid Pad Shuffle Steering Accident Avoidance Apex Drill Slalom

Car Control Clinic is not a prerequisite to either Drivers Education or Autocross. Those who participate in the Car Control Clinic may want to advance to either or both of these Florida Citrus Region events in the future.

Register soon for the Car Control Clinic on September 27, 2015. Then plan on coming back on Sunday for the German Excellence/Florida Citrus Region Autocross on Sunday. Registration Note: Unlike other driving events, the Car Control Clinic has all students behind the wheel for the entire day, so "car sharing" isn't possible. But that's okay – everyone bring their own car, even if it is not a Porsche! To answer the burning question, there will be a beautiful Parade of Porsches on the streets of French Lick and West Baden, Indiana on Saturday. That is how the Parade name originated. Over the last 60 consecutive years, Parade has grown from simple beginnings to the huge event it is today, with 1044 individual entries from around the United States and Canada this year.

At the concours banquet on Tuesday night, Mike Robbins from Central Indiana Region was honored in front of the assembled group, celebrating his 57th consecutive year of attending PCA Parade. Stuttgart. The heart of Porsche beats in Zuffenhausen. It was here in 1963 that the first 911 rolled off the assembly line. No other sports car sparks as much fascination, no other vehicle thrills more automobile enthusiasts worldwide. It is the essence of the Porsche marque. Taking inspiration from this heritage, the British artist Gerry Judah has created a sculpture. It consists of three pillars up to the height of 24 m, each crowned with a Porsche 911 mounted at the top. The vehicles hail from different 911 generations as a tribute to the history of the classic. The sculpture on Porscheplatz will become the new centrepiece for visitors from all over the world.

This evening marked the public presentation of the sculpture entitled "Inspiration 911". Cordoned off specifically for the occasion, the Porscheplatz offered an impressive setting. A combination of lightshow, film and vehicle choreography. With the glass facade of the Porsche Museum used as a screen, the film clips could be projected on to an area of more than 200m². A moving display included vehicles that are also com-

ponents of the art piece: An F-series from 1970, a G-series from 1981 as well as the latest generation 911. Spectacular light effects utilising the special architecture of the museum fascinated spectators. As a finale, the current model range of Porsche was showcased to guests on the grandstands.

Matthias Müller, CEO of Porsche AG, said during his address at the event: "The sculpture that we present today is more than a work of art. It is also a symbol for our company's close ties with Stuttgart." In recent years, Porsche has invested around one billion Euros in facilities in the greater Stuttgart area. Furthermore, an additional 1.1 billion Euros have been earmarked for the recently-established safeguarding of locations – a large proportion of which is to be invested in Zuffenhausen. The commitment to the Swabian roots could not be clearer.


Technical Article by Fred Kohly

I'm often asked, "How do you get your paint looking so good?" Of course, the answer is that it starts with superior paint, which our Porsche cars are fortunate to have. Even though the paint technology has changed over the years, the older cars can still look outstanding and right out of a show room. This article addresses some of the basics of wax rather than how to apply it. We can deal with that in a later article. Your car paint, like your skin, has pores or tiny little holes. These openings in the paint surface can allow dirt, water and other chemicals to infiltrate, which could damage or dull your finish. Car wax can play a role in maintaining that pristine bright new look.

The waxes used for car paint generally come in two forms known as Carnauba and the new Synthetic waxes often referred to as "paint sealants". Carnauba is an interesting product and is generally preferred by car enthusiasts and collectors, as it seems to provide a rich, warm, liquid pool-like glow that shimmers in changing light conditions. It seems to blend into the paint, as opposed to sitting on the paint and provides an excellent shine.

It is a natural product, which comes from a type of palm tree in Brazil known as the "tree of life". This very unusual tree produces a waxy matter on its leaves for the purpose of protection during the long hot dry months. Carnauba is solidified in its original form and serves a dual purpose for the tree. It protects itself against the harsh sun and it repels any occasional rain to the ground to be absorbed by the roots. What's truly amazing about this rock hard substance is that the carnauba coating on the leaves still allows the tree to breathe. Remember from Junior High science that green plants take in carbon dioxide and expel oxygen. Sounds like the perfect product for our paint: rock hard, protection against the elements, dispels water and lets our paint breathe. How they came up with this idea is beyond me!

Not all Carnauba is the same, and different regions in Brazil are considered better than others. Carnauba can be harvested differently and is graded on quality, with the northern regions of the country produc-



ing the best. The chemical process and ingredients in making it into car wax can vary, but all are similar and no wax is 100% Carnauba. Even though some brands advertise it as such, they are referring to the quality of the wax as even the "very best" waxes are no more than 1/3 Carnauba.

Synthetic car waxes, also known as "paint sealants", are the creation of modern technology and science. Just like we can create synthetic oil for our engines, synthetic waxes are growing in popularity and growing in popularity among enthusiasts. They can provide a slightly different finish referred to as a "hard as gloss look", and provides just as much protection, while lasting even longer. Synthetic wax is easier to apply and can provide protection for 4-6 months, with some brands advertising up to 12 months. Carnauba waxes, on the other hand, usually offer 6-8 weeks protection. Of course, this depends for sure on the climate, the conditions you drive in, where you store your vehicle, and other variables.

So which type of wax is better? My answer is: use the one you like and fits your purpose and color the best. If you like to drive more and detail less, try a synthetic. It lasts longer, provides excellent protection, and is easier to apply.

Personally I like the synthetic on the daily drivers, like the wife's SUV for example. But for the Concours cars

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I still prefer the Carnauba. I like the way it looks, and the spray detailer I use (Meguiar's Quick mist and wipe Detailer) does not seem to be compatible with synthetic waxes so check your detailer spray.

As for brands of waxes to be frank I really can't tell the difference between Premium waxes and less expensive waxes, but in fairness I have not tried these over the top priced ones as of yet, and still experiment with different brands.

My good friend David Seeland (who sits in the PCA Technical Committee and answers the tech questions in the Panorama magazine) has won multiple Parades buys his supplies at Kmart, and then buys what's on sale. In 2010 I won my class in the Chicago Parade Concours and used a \$12.00 synthetic wax (Eagle One-Nanowax) recommended by GCPCA member Stan Pearlman who knows a thing or two about Concoursing.

I'm sure that there are many winners who use very expensive waxes with sophisticated applications and maybe they are better, but my recommendation is to use what you like, can afford, and makes your car look exceptional.

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Stuttgart. Today, the chequered flag marked the finish: after 21 months of production time, the final Porsche 918 Spyder came off the line in Stuttgart-Zuffenhausen according to schedule. But the legacy of this technology pioneer will reach far beyond its production time. Future generations of sports cars will benefit directly from innovations of the 918 Spyder.

The 918 Spyder was systematically developed to be a performance hybrid with plug-in technology. The hybrid super sports concept car made its debut at the 2010 Geneva International Motor Show where it met with overwhelming approval. In the summer of 2010, the Supervisory Board of Dr. Ing. h.c. F. Porsche AG gave the green light for its production development. When the car was launched on the market in late 2013, the 918 Spyder represented a continuation of a series of super sports cars in Porsche history. As technology pioneers they were, without exception, among the ultimate sports cars of their respective decades: the 904 Carrera GTS, the 959, the 911 GT1 and the Carrera GT. In 1963, for example, Porsche created a steel and polymer body for the 904 Carrera GTS that is a prime example of how to unite stability and lightweight design. In 1986, the 959 successfully introduced an electronically-controlled all-wheel drive system to the sports car world. Ten years later, the 911

GT1 paved the way for implementing carbon-fibre technology in production vehicles. In 2003, the Carrera GT made its debut as the first production vehicle whose monocoque and subframe were made entirely of carbon fibre reinforced polymer (CFRP).

Even more than any of its predecessors, the 918 Spyder is now providing strong impetus for the advanced development of technologies for the sports cars of the future. The key technology is a drive concept which combines a high-performance combustion engine with two electric motors; its ingenious operating strategy is one of the unique aspects of the 918 Spyder. It considers the various requirements ranging from an efficiency-oriented driving profile to maximum performance. In doing so, it is providing important know-how for future production developments. To realise the most benefits of the large spread between power and fuel consumption, Porsche developers defined a total of five operating modes. As in car racing, they are activated by a "map switch" on the steering wheel. Porsche applied its leading hybrid know-how in preparing the characteristic maps and the algorithm stored in them for controlling the three drive units and other systems. This know-how will also be applied to future hybrid drives.

The car also creates an important foundation for the hybrid drive of tomorrow in its thermal management

concept that features five separate cooling loops and the innovative hybrid cooling of the rear electric motor with air and water. Another example with future implications: the Porsche 918 Spyder can convert far more kinetic energy into electrical energy than other hybrid vehicles because of its intelligent control of generator functionality and conventional brakes. Its enormous regenerative power boosts efficiency and driving range. A similar form of this recovery system is implemented in the LMP1 prototypes of the 919 Hybrid which Porsche raced to an impressive 1-2 victory at the 24 hours of Le Mans. The 918 technology platform also blazed new trails with spectacular solutions like the all-carbon body, fully variable aerodynamics and adaptive rear axle steering. Adaptive aerodynamics and rear axle steering have already made their way into production sports cars, such as in the 911 Turbo models and in the 911 GT3 and 911 GT3 RS.

The 918 Spyder embodies classic Porsche virtues and sets cornerstones for the future. On the one hand, the car embodies performance. In September 2013, the super sports car – with 887 hp of system power – set the lap record for street-legal vehicles with production tyres on the North Loop of the Nürburgring with a time of 6 minutes 57 seconds – a record that has

never been equalled by any other car since. On the other hand, the car embodies efficiency. With a fuel consumption figure of around three litres of petrol per 100 km, the 918 Spyder consumes less fuel than most small cars in the standardised NEDC cycle. It convincingly illustrates the potential of plug-in hybrid technology – not only for economical driving, but more importantly for the typical sports car driving pleasure it can offer.

Porsche is also implementing innovative ideas in the manufacturing process for the hybrid super sports car. Porsche has applied for patents related to many of its innovations in assembly and quality assurance which fulfil the most stringent ergonomic requirements. They demonstrate that Porsche is setting the standard for innovative capabilities far beyond the automobile itself. For instance, the entire assembly process takes place with wireless tools. The best example: the battery-powered screwdrivers controlled via Bluetooth. They perform their work nearly silently, increase flexibility for workers at the workplace and ensure – via a database link – that specified torques are reliably performed and documented.






