Beautiful weather. Wonderful cars. Great people. Old friends. New friends. That is what the Porsche Werks Reunion is all about.


Oh, yea. And there is a little car show over the weekend – the *Amelia Island Concours de Elegance.*

The 2020 Porsche Werks Reunion happened quite literally days before the Covid shutdowns started. The Concours weekend is normally in March, but for 2021 Covid moved it to the end of May. Timing could not have been better – lots of people having a great time and lots of beautiful Porsches. And Florida Citrus Region was well represented on the judged field.




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made an attempt to clean it. The Club Sport's story was hard to compete with, so we were thrilled with second place.


transaxle cars. As an owner of a 928 for 18 years, it's refreshing to see these cars get some well-deserved attention.



I hope to see you soon!





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
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VERY SADLY, Florida Citrus lost one of our Charter Members, Walter (Ray) Herbert on March 25, 2021. Ray loved his Porsches and he loved PCA. In March 2019 he received a 55 year certificate from PCA, which he had framed and put in his study. His children, and wife Connie, thought this most appropriate as they never lived a day at their house without a Porsche in the garage. He even brought home their first-born in a 1963 356B. That tradition has continued in that their daughter has a 911S, while their son owns When Ray <u>was</u> two Boxsters. unable to get in and out of their last 911 in 2016, he did not want to give up the Porsche brand, so they purchased a 2016 Macan S, which Connie still enjoys.

Ray had been living at a long term care facility, Village on the Green, since December 2018 due to the need of more care than could be given to him alone at home with his Multiple System Atrophy form of Parkinsons, diagnosed in 2004. He was fine, however, in a wheelchair most of the time, but walking when supervised, eating regular diet and participating in activities, enjoying outings, etc. As everywhere, the health center was closed in March 2020 to all visitors due to COVID, yet the virus was brought in by workers. He went to the hospital with COVID in July 2020. He was in the COVID unit for three weeks, and after all else failed, he was given plasma and subsequently tested negative. He was in the hospital another two weeks when Connie finally got to see him after five months. Unfortunately, Ray was not returning to pre-COVID status. He was bedridden and tube fed. At that point he was sent to Encompass Rehabilitative Hospital until mid-November, at which time Connie brought him home. He never gave up, but his body did. She is so thankful for the time they had together following COVID, but knows he is finally at peace.

Connie asked to remain affiliated with FLC, as she too, is a PCA member and Charter Member of the Citrus Region, even though she has been unable to participate as of late. She is not comfortable driving through Orlando, especially at night, so hopefully we will see her at club meetings when held at Porsche Orlando. ■

Look for the fall/winter schedule to be announced in July. Come join and to drive your Porsche the way the engineers designed it.



Could you be missing out on one of the best events available for Florida Citrus Region PCA members?

So, what is an autocross? Briefly, autocross is a performance driving event where you maneuver your car through a course of soft orange traffic cones trying to be faster than your competition. Check Tech Tactics #25 on PCA.org for a more detailed description. PCA has numerous classes that rank cars of similar performance together from showroom stock (S), just as it came from the dealer, to production (P) with a few mods, to (I) improved with more changes allowed to (M) modified, in which virtually anything goes. Most cars at Citrus events are in either (S) or (P) classes. To learn the course, which is always a different design, walking it first helps one visualize where you can be quicker and when you must slow down. There will be a guided course walk for novices and anyone else who wants to. The shortest distance around a turn is often faster, though some corners will allow one to carry more speed with a wider line resulting in a better time. Like any sport you have enjoyed, you will have fun, enjoy the competition and the challenge to improve.

Why would you want to bring your Porsche to an autocross (AX)? First, it is a lot of FUN to drive your car closer to its limits than possible on the street. Safety is paramount with the maximum speed rarely, if ever, faster than second gear. The limit is not speed-related but car contro,l as the corners are many with the straight sections few and short. The second and more important reason to do this is to learn how your car reacts to sudden changes of direction and to improve your driving, particularly how you can react faster to avoid a crash on the street. Most veterans of this sport can recall incidents in which their "autocross reflexes" saved them from a collision. Much safer for a newly-licensed teen to learn how the car will react in this safe

environment than to experiment in their daily driving. Instructors are available for those who want them. Some elements of Street Survival Schools are similar to AX.

Who does this sport? Pretty much anyone with a driver's license. The driver of the fastest Porsche at the March AX drives a class P5 2001 Boxster S and does the course "walk" in a wheelchair. A very talented driver. There are usually a couple of 80+ geezers and sometimes teenagers, though most are between those ages. There are always several female drivers and, in fact, there is a ladies class. Some also do DE or have in the past. Some have road circuit raced, but most are just regular PCA members. What cars are driven? Rarely we see a 356 or 914, almost always 924s and 944s with many Boxsters, Caymans and all flavors of 911 up to GT-3s, as well as the occasional Porsche sedan or SUV.

When can you AX? FLC has an event most months from January to May or June, seldom in July or August due to heat and thundershowers, then resuming from September to December. The schedule and registration are on <u>clubregistration</u>. <u>net</u>, in the Spiel, and at the FLC website, <u>flc.pca.org</u>. Other nearby PCA regions AX regularly, as do MSCC and SCCA.

Where can you autocross? Lake Tech (formerly called the Lake County Sheriffs Training Center) in Tavares is the primary site for the Citrus AXs, but we do get an occasional date at Orange County Convention Center. Plus, FLC runs the Zone AX during the OctoberFast PCA club races and DE at Daytona. We use the go-kart track inside NASCAR turns 3 and 4, -- a fine AX site. All mentioned have indoor plumbing toilets. Lake Tech has a picnic pavilion where lunch was included after the AX... before the pandemic restrictions. Hopefully this will be back before long to enhance the social aspects where you can get to know other members... and share excuses for not having better times.

Are there any downsides to driving your Porsche at an AX? Few, if any. There will be slightly more tire wear. If you hit a cone, it may make a mark on the car that is easily cleaned off, but adds a second (or 2) to your time. The number of runs will vary, with five typical. The run times are less than a minute so nowhere near the wear of one DE track session. Generally, just good exercise for your Porsche.

What do I need to get ready? 1. Register at <u>www.clubregistration.net</u> right after the event is announced. 2. Be sure your car is ready – just normal maintenance. 3. Arrive at the site and remove all loose items from your car. It will have a tech inspection for obvious issues. 4. Check your helmet to be sure it is rated SA2010 or newer. Loaners (provided by German Excellence) are available in the trailer if needed. 5. Attend the drivers meeting for more information. 6. ENJOY. ■

The new Porsche 911 GT3 with Touring package

A high-performance athlete that does not show off about its talent, and loves understatement: that is the new Porsche 911 GT3 with Touring package. The seventh edition of the powerful 375 kW (510 PS) GT car can now be ordered with the equipment package that was extremely popular for its predecessor. This purist 911 GT3 with a weight of just 1,418 kilograms is delivered with a six-speed GT sports gearbox as standard. For the first time, the Touring package can also be combined with the 7-speed PDK dual-clutch transmission at no extra cost.

The most conspicuous difference on the exterior is omission of the fixed rear wing of the 911 GT3. The necessary downforce at high speeds and even more understatement are guaranteed by an automatically extending rear spoiler. Silver-coloured trim strips made of high-gloss anodised aluminium on the side windows are another distinguishing feature that underline the newcomer's discreet appearance. The front end is painted completely in the exterior colour. The interior with extended leather items in Black is particularly elegant and is available exclusively for the GT3 with Touring package. The front of the dashboard and the upper side sections of the door trim panels have special surface embossing.

The name 'Touring package' goes back to an equipment variant of the 911 Carrera RS from model year 1973. Already then, the focus was on purist 911 design and elements of a classic interior. Porsche revived the idea again in 2017, and for the first time again offered a Touring package for the previous generation of the 911 GT3, the Type 991. Since then, this variant has appealed above all to lovers of top-class sports cars with a pronounced passion for understatement and classic driving pleasure.

Performance without the show: the exterior and interior details. A rear lid grille with the 'GT3 touring' logo in unique design is located over the high-revving engine. The trim strips of the side windows and the tailpipes of the sports exhaust system are silver-coloured. These elements are finished in satin-gloss Black in the optional Touring package. The front light modules are dark-tinted in this case.

The 911 GT3 with Touring package also offers the atmosphere of a classic sports car in the interior. The steering wheel rim, gear/selector lever, cover of the centre console, armrests in the door panels and the door handles are covered in black leather. The partial leather interior features black stitching. The seat centre panels are covered with black fabric, and the roofliner is also black. The head restraints bear embossed Porsche Crests. The door entry guards and trim elements on the dashboard and centre console are made of brushed black aluminium.

Porsche also offers almost all the optional equipment for the 911 GT3 in combination with the Touring package. This includes all exterior and wheel colours, LED headlights with Porsche Dynamic Light System and Porsche Dynamic Light System Plus, various assist systems, the ceramic brake PCCB, the lift system on the front axle, all seat variants, the Chrono package and the audio systems.

Porsche Design also offers a very special chronograph for customers of the 911 CT3 with Touring package. The timepiece features a movement with flyback function. The winding rotor evokes the vehicle's wheel design and is available in six different versions corresponding to the vehicle configuration. The dial bezel in Agate Grey Metallic is based on the vehicle's paint finish. The dial itself has a matte black finish, while the luminous yellow chronograph hands match the colour of the rev counter. The chronograph 911 GT3 with Touring package is worn with a strap made of Porsche vehicle leather with "GT3" embossing. The black decorative stitching with Porsche vehicle thread gives the strap an additional finishing touch. The chronograph is produced by the company's own Swiss watchmaking factory and is exclusively reserved for owners of the vehicle.

Couring

With know-how from motorsport: the Porsche 911 GT3. With the seventh edition of this high-performance sports car, Porsche has transferred race technology to a production model more systematically than ever before: the double-wishbone front suspension as well as the uncompromising aerodynamics with swan-neck rear wing – excluded from the Touring package – and striking diffuser originate from the successful 911 RSR GT racing car, and the 375 kW (510 PS) 4.0-litre six-cylinder boxer engine is based on the drive unit of 911 GT3 R tried and tested in endurance racing.

Despite a wider body, larger wheels and additional technical features, the weight of the new GT3 is on a par with its predecessor. It weighs 1,418 kg with the manual transmission and 1,435 kg with the Porsche dual-clutch transmission (PDK). The bonnet made of carbon fibre-reinforced plastic (CFRP), lightweight glass windows and forged alloy wheels exemplify the focus on weight-saving, as does the lightweight sports exhaust system.



Its racing genes are expressed in practically all the details of the new 911 GT3. The cockpit is equipped with a track screen for the first time: at the push of a button, the digital displays on the left and right of the central rev counter are reduced to the essential information on tyre and oil pressure, oil and coolant temperature and fuel tank fill level. The 911 GT3 has an easily accessible Mode switch on the steering wheel. This facilitates fast switching between Normal settings and the customisable Sport and Track modes.

Porsche is offering the 911 GT3 at a starting price of 170,969 euros including VAT and country-specific equipment. The Touring package can now also be ordered as an option at no extra charge. ■
